Types Of Questions Parents Can Ask:

- √ Why did you do (or not do) that?
- √ What were you thinking?
- √ Why didn't you do what I asked you to do?
- √ Did you feel guilty for not doing what I asked you to do?
- √ How do you think I felt when I found out you didn't do it?
- √ Did you think you would get away with it?
- √ Did you think what you did was the right thing to do?
- √ If not, what do you need to do about it now?
- √ What will you do the next time you are tempted in this way?
- √ How will you make yourself do what is right when you don't want to?
- √ How are you going to regain my trust?

Unacceptable Responses To Questions Parents Ask:

- √ I don't know
- √ I am not sure
- √ I think so

- √ Possibly

- √ Sort of
- √ I am pretty sure
- √ Whatever

“That was a ‘yes’ or ‘no’ question and needs a ‘yes’ or ‘no’ answer.”
